Students were asked "If you are not studying in the 2006-07 academic year, do you plan to do so in the next year or two?" The following table shows the response of the 670 graduates who answered the question.

The results indicate that in addition to the 24% of the Class of 2006 who were studying in 2006-07 (see Table 1.a.), another 47% of the class expected to go on to some kind of graduate/professional study in the next two years.
