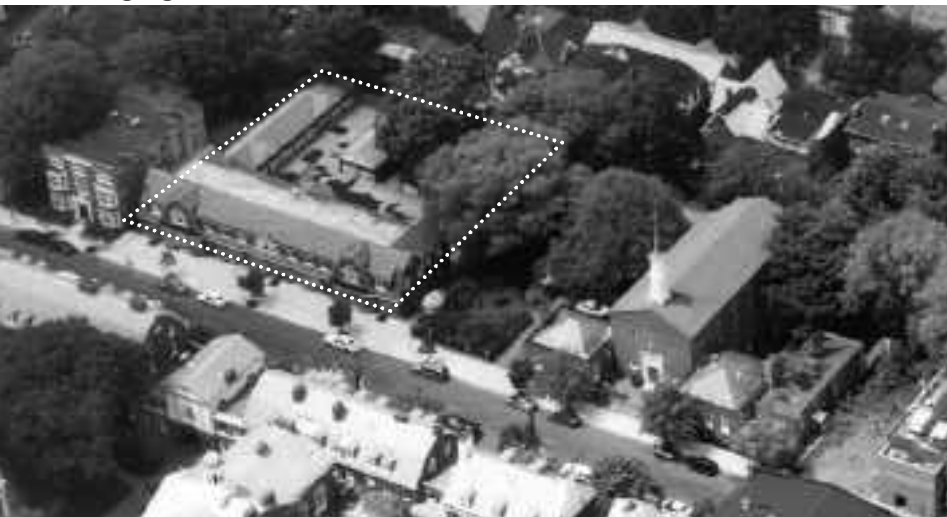
Yale Makes Property Available for Catholic Student Center

Dear Friend of More House,

In a tremendous demonstration of support, the Officers of Yale University, under the leadership of President Richard Levin, have agreed to make property on Park Street available to the Saint Thomas More Corporation for the construction of a Catholic student center adjacent to the Chapel.

The property, immediately south of Saint Thomas More, allows for a significantly expanded program of Catholic ministry to be fully housed in a center that will approximate 35,000 square feet. Architectural plans have already begun in earnest, under the expert

direction and incomparable inspiration of world-class architect Cesar Pelli.

“This decision by Yale is a strong affirmation of our effort to create a top-rate Catholic intellectual and spiritual center, that will be the very best center in the country,” said Judge Guido Calabresi ’53, ’58 LLB, President of the Saint Thomas More Board of Trustees, following a meeting with President Levin at which a 99-year lease agreement for the property was agreed upon. Judge Calabresi added that “President Levin has shown great support of religious life on campus and we are truly grateful.”

The meeting began with President Levin thanking Rev. Robert L. Beloin, Chaplain, for the ministry he and Sr. Jo-Ann Veillette, Associate Chaplain, provide Catholic students. In recent years the number of Catholic students at Yale has risen significantly. It is estimated that Catholics now comprise between 20 and 25 percent of the undergraduate population at Yale.

During the six years of Fr. Beloin’s tenure as Chaplain, moreover, the number of Catholic students participating actively in the Chapel has increased dramatically.

“Fr. Beloin arrived on campus and infused Catholic ministry with new life. He brought into sharp focus a vision of what More House could be, and has been as committed as the Chapel’s

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Campaign Goal is Raised to \$15 Million Over \$5 Million Secured in Gifts and Pledges

With additional property available for a larger student center and over \$5 million secured in gifts and pledges, the campaign goal has been raised to \$15 million. The new goal includes \$10 million for the Building Fund and \$5 million for the Endowment Fund.

Catholic alumni from across the country, spanning six decades have been extremely supportive and enthusiastic about Saint Thomas More's campaign. The effort to expand Catholic life at Yale, both physically and programmatically, is historic.

Kerry A. Robinson, Director of Development, works closely with Fr. Robert L. Beloin, Chaplain, in communicating to Catholic alumni the inspiring plans for Saint Thomas More and the future of Catholic life at Yale. Catholic students arrive on campus with a wide disparity of faith literacy. Informed by what contributes

to a vibrant campus ministry program, Ms. Robinson and Fr. Beloin meet with Catholic alumni to share the good news of new programs and ministries and increased student participation in Catholic life. Raising money for this expansion of Catholic ministry is essential to the flourishing of Catholic life at Yale. And it is a happy problem that with the increased number of programs and students, there is simply not enough space. "What fuels the entire campaign is the desire to effect the best example of a Catholic intellectual and spiritual center. The brightest and most talented young adults in the world are students at Yale. At least twenty percent of them are Catholic. They will graduate to become leaders in myriad industries and sectors. They are also future leaders in the Church. That there is an opportunity for them to grow in a mature Catholic faith while advancing intellectually at Yale is of paramount importance to us," says Ms. Robinson.

Catholic alumni are essential to the success of this effort. The financial commitment of Catholic alumni will enable the chaplaincy to provide the most effective pastoral, intellectual, and spiritual ministry to Catholic students for generations to come. ♦

Cesar Pelli Selected as Architect

Cesar Pelli and Associates, the internationally acclaimed architectural firm, has been selected to design the Saint Thomas More Catholic Student Center. Noted for being the architect responsible for the world's tallest building, the Petronas Towers in Malaysia, and architect of the Reagan National Airport in Washington, D.C., the

World Financial Center in New York, and Canary Wharf in London, Pelli brings elegance, artistic genius, and unrivaled élan to Saint Thomas More. Mr. Pelli, along with associates Darin Cook and George Knight, has been working closely with the building committee in early stages of the campaign, translating the programmatic vision into square footage and designing a preliminary footprint. Mr. Pelli was dean of the Yale School of Architecture from 1977 to 1984, and his offices are located in New Haven, just blocks from Saint Thomas More Chapel. ♦

The Fay Vincent Fellowship for Catholic Faith and Culture Established

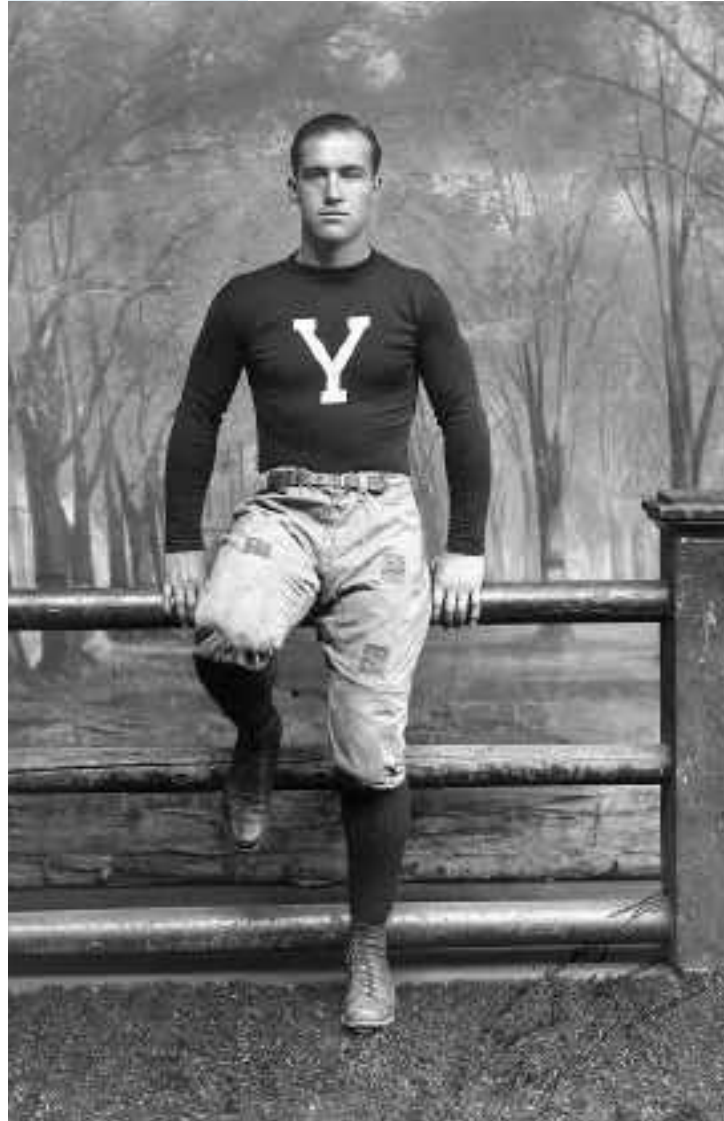
Francis (Fay) T. Vincent, Jr. '63 LLB, has established a Fellowship for Catholic Faith and Culture at Saint Thomas More in memory of his father, Francis (Fay) T. Vincent '31.

Modeled after the Chubb Fellowship at Yale, the Fay Vincent Fellowship will allow for a person of national or international recognition to spend a day and a half at Yale, to meet with students over meals and during the informal moments of the day. The visit will culminate in a significant lecture open to the whole University community. The fellowship is a powerful example of the sort of expansion in program the board of trustees at Saint Thomas More aspires to offer Catholic students. Inviting luminaries to campus to speak about their accomplishments in their field of expertise, and prevailing upon them to speak about their achievements and struggles from the perspective of their Catholic faith, will allow students the opportunity to examine the relationship of faith and work in the world.

Fay Vincent, Jr. has had a long and distinguished career in business, including serving as President and C.E.O. of Columbia Pictures Industries, Inc.; Executive Vice President of The Coca-Cola Company; and Commissioner of Major League Baseball.

The first Fay Vincent Fellowship is expected to take place in the Fall of 2001 and will thereafter be an annual event, to be permanently endowed by Mr. Vincent. ♦

Capital Campaign Case Statement

Building on the rich heritage of the past, and responding to the increasing number of Catholic students at Yale and their attendant intellectual and spiritual expectations, the Board of Trustees of Saint Thomas More has initiated a five-year, \$15 million capital campaign. The major aims of the campaign are to raise \$10 million for **The Saint Thomas More Building Fund** that will enable a student center to be built, adjacent to the Chapel. The balance of the campaign's goal is destined for **The Saint Thomas More Endowment Fund**, to enable an expansion of the programs offered to students and faculty. Through this capital campaign, Saint Thomas More can fulfill its potential to be nationally recognized as a comprehensive center for intellectual and spiritual life.

The Building Fund

It is critical that Catholic students have a facility in which to meet. Currently, students meet in the Chaplain's residence or in the basement of the Chapel itself. The administrative offices are prohibitively small for meetings of more than two or three persons. As the Catholic population at Yale has grown and as the programmatic ministries offered to students have gained in popularity, the need for adequate space has become evident. The new building would include the following:

- a modernized library, with books and periodicals on Catholic thought, catalogued and accessible to students;
- a multi-purpose hall, with multi-media capability, for lectures and receptions;
- a food service facility open to the entire Yale community;
- meeting rooms for lectures, seminars, Small Church Communities, RCIA instruction, lay leadership training, and Chapel committees;
- a meditation room and a room for the Sacrament of Reconciliation;
- a student lounge;
- storage space for the weekly soup kitchen and other service programs sponsored by the Chapel;
- an expansion of the administrative offices;
- an open courtyard;
- a welcoming reception area.

The new facilities will be handicapped accessible, allowing access to the Chapel and all areas of the student center and administrative offices. Perhaps most importantly, the expansion will allow the Catholic Chapel and student center to be open, inviting, and easily accessible throughout the day and evening, every day of the week. Currently the Chapel and office are kept locked because there is not a reception area for students and guests, or adequate resources for a receptionist.

The Endowment Fund

Despite inadequate facilities, the programs provided by the Chapel to undergraduates, graduate and professional students, and faculty are significant and are well received. The Chaplain, Fr. Robert Beloin, and the Associate Chaplain, Sr. Jo-Ann Veillette, provide opportunities for faith formation, theological reflection, participation in the sacramental life of the Church, intellectual advancement, voluntary service, and leadership training, all within a distinctly Yale context. Everything that occurs at More House reflects its mission: to connect Catholic faith and high intellectual pursuit and achievement. How one's faith informs, and is informed by, one's scholarship and presence in the world is at the heart of the ministry at More House.

The Endowment Fund will enable Saint Thomas More to provide and expand many programs currently offered to students. For example, Saint Thomas More sponsors a “Small Church Community” structure in which students and faculty meet weekly for prayer and scripture study based on the readings of the following Sunday. The Chapel provides opportunities for social service including a weekly soup kitchen, a “Big Sib/Little Sib” mentoring program with underprivileged children of New Haven, hospice ministry with the severely ill in New Haven, alternative Spring Break opportunities, and other social justice programs. The Chapel will be capable of having a resource center for service opportunities with national and international volunteer programs during summers or after graduation.

With the proper resources, Saint Thomas More will be able, on a regular basis, to co-sponsor and host symposia on inter-disciplinary subjects, with departments and graduate schools of the University. Likewise, the new center will be able to accommodate ecumenical and interfaith discussions, connecting More House to the other faith communities on campus. The center will have the capacity for scholars in residence and visiting lecturers.

Saint Thomas More will be able to collaborate with the Department of Religious Studies and the Divinity School by providing a lecture series every semester, for University credit. The new center will allow for an expansion of the weekly dinner discussions and monthly lectures, enable a film series, and provide a venue for graduate gatherings. The center will allow for recreational and social interaction, as well as provide an opportunity to connect with alumni, faculty, and students from all residential colleges and graduate schools.

Upon the successful realization of the capital campaign, Saint Thomas More will be able to provide and expand the following:

- annual fellowships on Catholic faith and culture, science, law, and medicine;

- a Small Church Community program that has served as the model for other campus ministries across the country;
- a vibrant liturgical experience and a greater involvement in the sacramental life of the Church;
- faith formation and catechetics;
- opportunities for volunteer service;
- lay leadership and young adult training;
- a visiting Catholic lecture series every semester for University credit;
- weekly dinner discussions and monthly lectures on contemporary Catholic theology;
- expanded opportunities for retreats;
- ecumenical and interfaith discussions;
- graduate students’ gatherings;
- recreational and social interaction;
- student internships in campus ministry. ♦

The Long-Term Endowment Trust

As part of the campaign’s efforts to increase the endowment, devoted alumnus Mr. John Clarke Kane ’33 has initiated **The Saint Thomas More Long-Term Endowment Trust** to benefit the Chapel. This Trust is a welcome addition to the capital campaign, beginning as a very thoughtful response to our, then inchoate, development plans. It has been very carefully structured with the long-term viability of the Chapel in mind. When the Trust reaches 2.6 million dollars, the entire net income of the Trust shall be given to The Saint Thomas More Endowment Fund.

Furthermore, an anonymous donor has offered to match every four dollars contributed to The Long-Term Endowment Trust with one dollar, up to \$100,000. ♦
