## Membership

Over the summer, a membership committee was formed to develop a brochure to be used as a marketing tool for YUWO. This brochure detailed the current activities and the goals of the organization. In August the brochure and membership applications were mailed to the membership and prospective members. All new Yale hires and newly retired Yale female employees received the brochure with a welcoming letter and an invitation to the September Wine and Cheese reception. Membership applications were accepted at the Wine and Cheese reception and at the first meeting of the Fall Study Group. Application forms were included with the September, October and November newsletters. Reminder postcards were mailed to delinquent members in November.

In '08-'09 there were 384 YUWO members. This is an increase of thirty-eight members from the previous year. The 384 members include 64 newcomers.

A membership directory was sent to all members in good standing with the December newsletter.

As postage costs now exceed the price of printing the newsletter, we strongly urge the membership to receive the newsletter electronically. Currently 139 members—36%—of the members receive the newsletter by email.

Donations to the various YUWO Scholarship funds were sent to the Membership Chair. These were documented, forwarded to the Assistant Treasurer and the documentation sent to the Corresponding Secretary for acknowledgment. — *Audrey DeFronzo*

## **Scholarship Committee 2008-2009 Annual Report**

This academic year, fifty-five women showed an interest in the YUWO Scholarship program to the committee and thirty-three returned written applications between November and March 1, 2009.

Nine scholarships totaling \$14,625 will be used in the upcoming academic year 2009-2010. The amounts awarded ranged from \$625 to \$3000. This brings the total number of recipients to 291 women and the total amount of monies given since the inception of the scholarship program to \$273,025.

We are grateful once again for the generous donations from the YUWO community as a whole, the returns of wisely managed funds and for the active participation in YUWO programs. We are especially grateful for the gifts from Dr. John Fenn to the Magee Fenn Scholarship Fund.

**April:** Margaret Grey: Dean Yale School of Nursing on "*The Role of the Advanced Practice Nurse in the Delivery of Health Care.*"

Through the good offices of Linda Lorimer, Vice President and Secretary of the University, we were able to use the main meeting room of the Visitor Center at 149 Elm Street. Four of our six meetings were held there. It is a space that has worked well for us and it is anticipated that we will be able to continue its use in the coming year. October's meeting was held in room 211 at the Hall of Graduate Studies, and our April meeting in the 4th floor lounge of Silliman College.

Attendance was consistently in the low thirties, with 43 the highest number of attendees.

## Minutes of the YUWO 2008 Annual Meeting

The 43rd Annual Meeting of the Yale University Women's Organization was brought to order by President Patty Pollard at noon on May 7, 2008 at the New Haven Country Club with 126 members and thirteen scholarship recipients in attendance.

President Pollard welcomed everyone and expressed particular, grateful recognition to Ann Childs, who presided at YUWO's first meeting 43 years ago and chaired the Study Group for 10 years. The President also thanked Marty Sherman for her splendid contributions to YUWO publications and communications.

There was an unanimous vote to accept the minutes of the May 2, 2007 Annual Meeting included in the Annual Report, copies of which were placed at each seat.

Nominating Chair Felicia Tencza presented by-law changes to create term consistency. Previously circulated to the membership, the by-law changes were unanimously approved.

Also included in the Annual Report, the Proposed Budget for 2008-2009 by Mary-Jo Warren was unanimously approved as well. Assistant Treasurer Carolyn Gould's Scholarship Fund Income Report totaling \$18,625.87 for 2007-2008 was contained in the Annual Report.

Nominating Committee member Pat Whitestone presented the 2008-2009 Slate of Officers: Activities Chair, Lyn Howe; Corresponding Secretary, Marie Santo; Vice President, Barbara Loucks; and President, Patty Pollard. The motion to accept the Slate of Officers was unanimously approved.

President Pollard honored Kay Ross for originating the idea of YUWO scholarships for the education of women in the Yale community. Scholarship Chair Alex Koontz, assisted by Priscilla Kissick, presented this year's awards, while Barbara Reif presented the Magee Fenn Scholarship and Carol Sirot the Sirot Scholarship Award. Following lunch, Vice President Johanna Becker introduced the speaker, Linda Koch Lorimer, Vice President and Secretary of Yale University. Her talk, entitled "Yale and Globalization," traced Yale's evolution from a regional to a national, to an international university. Under President Levin's charge to meet the demands of today's world, one in thirteen Yale undergraduates now comes from outside the U.S., vs. one in fifty, fifteen years ago. Every student now has the opportunity to study abroad and internationalism is also built into many graduate school programs. Lorimer added that certain Yale scientific research is being interdigitalized as well as communicated via video conference with researchers abroad.

Following the talk, President Pollard thanked the Annual Luncheon Committee, chaired by Marcia MacDonald and assisted by Roz Daitch, Genevieve Goff and Rita Trayner for their good work and called attention to the volunteer forms on every table. The President also expressed appreciation to Carol Hogan (and husband) for handling YUWO mailings and passed along greetings and an invitation from Jane Levin, presently in Greece. Mrs. Levin has invited YUWO members to the Yale President's House on Tuesday, September 16, 4:30-6pm for a Wine and Cheese Reception.

The meeting adjourned at 2:10.

## *Exploring Yale and New Haven County*

At the end of September we visited the impressive new Quinnipiac athletic facility in Hamden, and got a view of some of the new plans and projects on that campus. We were welcomed with tea and cookies in October, when we toured the Marsh Gardens and Greenhouses where plants are grown for research and study by Yale faculty and students. Then on a chilly bright winter day, a YUWO group toured the renovated Paul Rudolph Hall and the Loria (History of Art) center, where expert student guides explained all the changes and improvements that had taken place in the renovation. The last exploration of New Haven is scheduled for late April. ## **2007-2008 Excursions**

The Fall 2008 YUWO excursion was a bus trip to the New York Botanical Garden on October 23 to see two special exhibits: *Henry Moore Monumental Sculptures* and *Kiku: The Art of the Japanese Chrysanthemum*. The day began with a private tram tour of the grounds of the Garden with a very good docent who commented on the 20 Henry Moore sculptures which were positioned throughout the Garden. The 47 participants then disbursed for lunch on their own, after which they had time to tour the chrysanthemum show and other exhibits on their own. A \$65 fee for this trip covered bus transportation and tip, and admission and tram tour at the Garden

The Spring 2009 YUWO excursion will be a bus trip to the famous Glass House, designed by Philip Johnson, in New Canaan on April 27. Because this trip was so popular in October of 2007, and only 20 people can be accommodated on one trip, the names of participants were drawn by lottery. The cost of this trip is \$65 which covers bus transportation and tip and a 90-minute docent-led tour of the Glass House and its adjacent buildings and grounds. Lunch is up to each participant, with plenty of eateries around the Visitor Center on Main Street in New Canaan.
