Get your YUWO Newsletter Online!

We continue to urge YUWO members to consider receiving their YUWO monthly newsletter via email rather than through the US mail. We now have some 50 members taking advantage of this convenience and we hope more and more of you will give it a try. If you decide, after trying it, that you really prefer to continue receiving a hard copy, you can "opt out" and we will be happy to put you back on the regular mailing list. You can also choose to receive it BOTH online and by mail for a trial period, to see which you prefer.

With this newsletter (November 2005), we are going to change our online delivery process slightly. Instead of sending you the actual newsletter as an attachment to the email message as we have in the past, we will be sending out an email on the same day the newsletter goes to the printer, notifying you that it is available on the website and giving you the link to access it. You can then download it from the website exactly as you did from your email (it will still require Adobe Acrobat Reader to open). This process will circumvent the problems that a few members have encountered with emailers or internet service providers blocking the attachment for reasons of size, compression protocols, spam blocking (security), etc. Once you open the file in Acrobat Reader (your email notification will include a link to Adobe's website to download a free copy of Reader if you don't already have it), you can save the PDF file to your hard drive for future reference, or print it out.

In addition to saving YUWO postage costs (and "guaranteeing" delivery!), those who sign up for online delivery will receive notification and access information just as soon as the newsletter is available — at least a week before hard copies are delivered through the mail.

The name of the real ship, that sank on February 5, 1941 – during World War II – was the S/S Politician. Having left Liverpool two days earlier, heading for Jamaica, it sank outside Eriskay, The Outer Hebrides, Scotland in bad weather, containing 250,000 bottles of whisky. The locals gathered as many bottles as they could, before the proper authorities arrived, and even today, bottles are found in the sand or in the sea every other year.
